


It takes a village

My children are too young to remember the excitement of the 2002 Games—they weren't there to see the Olympic torch blazing in the heart of our city or to watch snowboarding in its second-ever appearance at the Winter Games. To them, the Hoberman Arch is just a marker we pass on the way home from the airport.

But in 2034, that will change. A new generation—more than a million children and young adults across this state—will grow up alongside our preparations for the Games. And they won't just watch history unfold; they'll help create it. I couldn't be more excited to see what they bring to the table—how they redefine possibility, embody the Olympic spirit, and showcase to the world what Utah is all about.
